GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS

WHAT IS A CHILD TRAVEL CONSENT FORM?

Child Travel Consent forms are increasingly necessary due to closer attention by the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) to minor children traveling abroad alone, with only one parent or with someone who is not the parent or legal guardian. This attention is in response to higher incidents of child abductions in disputed custody cases and to protect potential victims of child pornography and human trafficking. Therefore, it is strongly recommended the child carry with him or her the Child Travel Consent signed by both parents or the non-traveling parent to present to immigration officers, the airline or the CBP. If the child is not traveling abroad but merely domestically, a Child Travel Consent can also come in handy for possible law enforcement checkpoints.

CHILD TRAVEL CONSENT PURPOSE AND DETAILS

A Child Travel Consent Form indicates the parent's or legal guardian's permission for the child to travel internationally or domestically when that parent or legal guardian is not physically with the child.

A Child Travel Form often includes the following:

- Basic information of the child such as name, birth date and passport information
- Basic information of the parents or legal guardians
- Basic information of the person accompanying and traveling with the child
- Travel destination(s)
- Dates of travel
- Purpose for the travel
- Contact information and address of the accommodations where the child will be staying while traveling

USE A CHILD TRAVEL CONSENT IF:

- Your child is traveling with only one parent (Consent signed by non-traveling parent)
- Your child is not traveling with either of the parents or legal guardians (Consent

signed by all parents or legal guardians) for these instances:

- S/he is traveling in school groups, teen groups, or vacation groups
- S/he is traveling in school groups, teen groups, or vacation groups
- S/he is traveling with his/her grandparents, uncles, aunts, teachers, babysitters, friends, or siblings
- S/he child is traveling alone

CHILD TRAVEL CONSENT BASICS:

A Child Travel Consent is not required by U.S. laws. However, if the child or the person traveling with the child is unable to present a Child Travel Consent, s/he might be detained by the CBP until the circumstances and situation can be evaluated. If the accompanying parent has sole custody or the other parent is deceased, traveling with the supporting paperwork would be helpful. For example, court decision, death certificate, or birth certificate of the child indicating only one parent.

The Child Travel Consent must be signed by either the non-traveling parent or legal guardian or all parents or legal guardians depending on who the child is traveling with. The dates of the signature typically do not exceed a year prior to the travel. While not required, it is strongly recommended that the signatures are done in the presence of either witnesses or notary publics. A notary acknowledgement adds a level of authenticity and is recommended by the CBP.

In addition, while U.S. laws do not require a Child Travel Consent Form, it is important to note that the form is legally required in other countries. The failure to present such a document might result in denial of entry.
